



EADCMRS YOG 2010 VERSION: SUMMARY OF CHANGES

At the Youth Olympic Games, our minor athletes will be competing on borrowed horses **provided by the Organiser**. Because of these unique circumstances, the FEI Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication Regulations have been slightly modified exclusively for the 2010 Youth Olympic Games (Singapore) to eliminate the strict liability concept for the Person Responsible. While the Person Responsible will remain the person primarily responsible, it will be necessary **for this Event only**, for the FEI to prove intent, fault, negligence or knowing use on the part of the Person Responsible, additional Person Responsible, or member of the Support Personnel to establish a rule violation. Specifically, the changes (red-lined) appear in the Preface, Article 2..1.1 of both the EAD and EMC Rules, and Article 7.4.1 of the EAD Rules (eliminating the automatic Provisional Suspension). These modifications which recognize that strict liability for the Person Responsible is not appropriate for this Event, nonetheless continue to permit disqualification of results if a Horse is determined to have competed with a Prohibited Substance to ensure a level playing field for all competitors.
